Photographer Alessandro Grassani has travelled across three continents to gather poignant testimonies of the effects of climate change on people's day-to-day lives.

From South-East Asia to Latin America, repeated disasters and gradual environmental degradation drive thousands of people away from their homes and their land in search of a better and safer life elsewhere.

The exhibition explores the complex links between environmental change, local livelihoods and migration through photographs taken in Bangladesh, Haiti, Kenya and Mongolia, through maps from the forthcoming Atlas of Environmental Migration presented publicly for the first time, and through a selection of documentaries.
